This guide* is an explanation of how to download and register to use the **NHS app.** Owned and run by the NHS, the NHS App is a simple and secure way to access a range of NHS services on your smartphone or tablet.

In summary the NHS App allows you to:


- Check your symptoms
- Access Coronavirus advice
- Find NHS information on hundreds of conditions
- Use NHS 111 for urgent help online
- Ask your GP for advice through eConsult
- View existing and book future appointments
- Order a repeat prescription through your nominated pharmacy

- View your GP medical record
- View messages from health services and the NHS App.
- Manage decisions around organ, tissue and blood donations.



The first step is to download the NHS App.

The NHS App is available now on iOS (from the App Store) and Android (from Google Play).



The NHS App is supported anywhere you travel including outside the country, however, must be supported by a UK mobile phone number.

Using an NHS login to use in the NHS app

You will be reminded that you must be aged 13 and over and registered with a GP surgery in England. Tap Continue to proceed.

If you already have an NHS login you can sign in using the username and password you have previously set up.

If you don't, you will be prompted to create a new account by setting up an NHS Login

Setting up a NHS login



To do this you will need:

- an email address
- a UK mobile phone number

You will be asked to provide an email address and create a password. Then the NHS will send you an email containing a link. Select the link in the email to confirm that it is your email address.

Then return to the app and enter the NHS login email address and password you have just created. Tapping on **"Continue"**...

... will open a new screen where you will be asked to give your mobile phone number.

Enter your phone number and tap on "Continue"



Setting up as a NHS Login


A 6-digit security code will be sent by text message to your mobile phone. You will be asked to enter this code to continue.

Enter your mobile phone number (07XXX XXXXX). A security code will be needed to log in every time, unless you select 'remember this device and stop sending security codes'. Tap on "Continue" to proceed.

Next you will be asked for proof of your identity. As you would expect for security and confidentiality, you need to evidence this. There are several options on how to do this:

- 1) If you are already registered to use the GP Practice online services, you can use the registration details used to set up your Systmonline Patient Access Account;
- 2) Alternatively you can provide evidence of your identity using the NHS app.

The next few pages take you through how to do this.





Prove who you are by using your GP surgery online registration information

If you are registered for your GP surgery's online services, you will have been given 3 registration details. You can use these 3 registration details to prove who you are instead of using photo I.D.

The 3 registration details are:

- Linkage Key (could be called Passphrase)
- O.D.S. Code (could be called Organisation Code or Practice I.D.)
- Account I.D.

This is <u>not</u> the same as the username and password you use to log into your GP surgery's online services.

Enter these details as prompted and then tap "Continue."

Once these steps are completed you will be able to use your NHS login to open the app using the email address and password you have just set up.

Providing evidence of your id using the NHS app

You will be asked to:

- take a photo of your I.D.
- record your face using your device
- enter your NHS number if you know it

We ask you to record your face so that we can compare it to your photo I.D. and prove who you are.

We may also ask you for more details to help find your NHS record, like your date of birth or postcode.






If you have completed all these steps properly then you can expect to hear confirmation within a couple of hours to say the identity check is all OK. Once these steps are completed you will be able to use your NHS login to access using your email address and password. You also have the option to login using biometric data, using fingerprint or facial recognition.
